What we found were some very special people that became our cheerleaders as we took the step to grow our family through the foster care system. For all the support I have received here at Allen Ave., I am grateful.

I could say that my own spiritual journey began in the in the religion of my youth, there was only one dish on the menu. In fact, even though I was baptized, had communion, confirmation, and was married in a Catholic church, I surprisingly know very little about the religion. The seed was planted, however. I spent many weeks and months in my early 20's in the desert of New Mexico doing yoga and meditation and this experience grew my understanding of the human need for a spiritual connection.

My son was able to attend a Waldorf inspired Preschool and as you may know, the philosophy of a Waldorf school is to not only develop the intellectual curiosity of the child but also the spirit. I finally understood this when Joseph and I attended an Advent event at the Waldorf School that involved the children lighting a candle and walking through a labyrinth of pine boughs. As we left there, I got it. If I give Joseph and Lizzie the opportunity to work their spiritual muscle, they will move toward adulthood with an understanding of what it means to not only be connected to others but to have a connection with a Higher Power they can place their trust in whether they are celebrating good experiences or learning through tough ones.
