

When evaluating nominations, the Social Justice Committee will use the following criteria:

- Organization or project shares our values and is consistent with our principles
- Local impact
- Organization is small enough that a contribution of \$400-\$500 will make a significant difference
- Provides volunteer opportunities for A2U2 members
- Organization has not been selected recently (though we have made exceptions)
- Recipients must be §501(c)(3) tax exempt charitable organizations.

The Wabanaki Alliance advocates for legislation and policies that improve the lives of Wabanaki citizens and our neighbors around the state, protect and preserve our environment, and honor tribal history and culture. #### **ADVOCACY IN SUPPORT OF LD 2007 – TRIBAL SOVEREIGNTY**

This bill would modernize the 1980 Settlements Acts and is based on some of the consensus recommendations from the bipartisan Task Force on Changes to the Maine Indian Claims Settlement Implementing Act. LD 2007 would restore tribal sovereignty to the Wabanaki Nations by establishing establish that the Passamaquoddy Tribe, the Penobscot Nation, the Houlton Band of Maliseet Indians and the Mi'kmaq Nation have the same rights to self-determination as other federally recognized Indian tribes within the United States.

#### **CONTACT YOUR MAINE REPRESENTATIVES**

A National Popular Vote bill, LD 1578, was introduced in the 131st legislative session but was carried over into 2024. We'll fight for it then, but in the meantime, anytime is a good time to contact your legislator about NPV.

Tell them you expect them to support and pass NPV in 2024! You can use this **template** to draft your email. NPV is nonpartisan. NPV favors voters, not parties, land, geography, factions, or states. NPV works within the constitution, and does not change or abolish the Electoral College.

The National Popular Vote Interstate Compact guarantees the presidency to the candidate who receives the most popular votes in all 50 states and the District of Columbia. With the National Popular Vote:

Every vote in every state in every presidential election will be equal. No battleground states, no spectator states.

The candidate with the most votes across all 50 states and DC will win. No 2nd place winners.
