There were 45 MUUSAN generated testimonies! That's 7.7% of the total 582 testimonies – that is VERY IMPRESSIVE given how relatively small UU churches are.

LD 2007 update: The sweeping sovereignty bill was narrowed significantly as an amended bill covering expanded criminal jurisdiction by tribal courts. This was negotiated with the governor and is supported by her. No action needed, but you may ask your legislators to vote for it on the floor, thank them if they do so, and also thank the governor for her continued willingness to expand tribal self-determination.

Housing Wins: Successful Housing Campaigns

Zoning and affordable housing: We worked on housing related zoning bills that would take steps to improve Maine's zoning laws to encourage housing affordability and help reverse segregation and exclusion in our cities and towns. LD 2003 sponsored by Speaker Ryan Fecteau and LD 1673 sponsored by Rep. Rachel Talbot Ross. LD 2003 was signed by the Governor and LD 1673 is expected to become law without the Governor's signature.

Housing vouchers: LD 473, sponsored by Rep. Victoria Morales, which would provide state housing vouchers to 1,000 households and institute a housing navigation program, passed the House and Senate! We are hopeful that MaineHousing will fund the programs outlined in LD 473.

Tenant Blacklists: We are very happy that LD 913 sponsored by Rep. Tavin Hasenfus, was signed into law. LD 913 will protect Mainers from unfair use of court data around evictions.



General Assistance: LD 910, sponsored by Rep. Michael Brennan, was partially funded with a \$10 million appropriation for municipalities to fund their General Assistance programs and help low income families facing economic emergencies to stay housed, fed and able to afford the medicine they need.

A2U2 has been a long time supporter of Project Feed.

Project Feed serves as many as 60 families in a week (many are 5-8 in number) although some are single. That said, on average they serve 130 unique households in a month with 400

plus individuals. They are allowed to come every other week. There is critical need at this time due to increased food prices and the growing asylum seeking population in the Portland area.

We are all being adversely affected by increased food prices, but the situation is

especially difficult for low income families and individuals.

Want to help in a different way? Project Feed desperately needs more volunteers on these days:

- Monday mornings from 9 11
- Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons from 12:30 - 3:00
- Friday mornings from 9 to 11



Volunteering may involve "sit-down" jobs that happen on Monday mornings, or computer help in the afternoons. Other needs involve restocking and/or picking up items from elsewhere. Some jobs

involve standing for periods of time (afternoon serving of clients), driving a truck, shopping, and/or lifting things to place on shelves.
